## **Statement on Conflict Minerals**

**S-P International** supports authorities, non-government organizations, and industrial associations in the efforts to stop the trade of Conflict Minerals (Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Act). This applies in particular to the trade of “3TG” (currently defined as Tin, Tantalum, Tungsten, and Gold) minerals from conflict areas, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and the adjacent countries that are mined under inhumane conditions.

While not subject to SEC reporting, **S-P International** is committed to ethical business principles and promotion of human rights. **S-P International** fully supports the legislation and its position to avoid the use of Conflict Minerals and responsibly work with our customers, suppliers, and industry organizations to create a system of controls to insure transparency and traceability for the products associated with Conflict Minerals material.

**S-P International** also understands this is an important concern worldwide, although formal guidelines may vary between countries. The Electronics Industry has been proactive via the Electronic Industry Citizenship Coalition (EICC), and we will continue to follow EICC’s actions and recommendations as they apply to this issue. **S-P International** also will continue to work with our suppliers to ensure that we are able to identify the use of Conflict Minerals in our supply chain.
